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
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The Growing Use Of CJ Control: 293 % growth in ~30 years


What do justice actors do?

Seamless System: Integration of CJ processes with behavioral and medical health

- ◆ **Assessment**
- ◆ **Treatment**
- ◆ **Social Controls (drug testing, electronic monitoring, etc.)**
- ◆ **Compliance Management**

Different Roles of Justice Officers



No empirical evidence for:

- ✓ Transitional case management
- ✓ Case management
- ✓ Passive referrals
- ✓ Psychosocial education

Empirical Evidence for:

- ✓ Facilitate offender change
- ✓ Focus on Initiate and Retention in Tx
- ✓ Use of Rewards to Increase Compliance
- ✓ Use problem solving strategies

Justice Actor Role in Offender Change

- ◆ Traditional Model: supervision officer is social control agent specifying rules, overseeing monitoring
- ◆ Supervision officer *is* the facilitator of change
 - ◆ Core Correctional Practices--EPICS-II, STARR, PCS, RNR
 - ◆ Structured face-to-face contact with format of:
 - ◆ Understand *criminogenic* needs, target in supervision
 - ◆ Assess rationalization of behavior
 - ◆ Problem solve & set target behaviors
- ◆ Therapeutic approach where treatment is agent of change
 - ◆ T4C, CBT, Therapeutic Community etc.
 - ◆ Emphasis on clinical hours: 300 hrs for higher risk; 200 hrs for moderate risk
 - ◆ Officer monitors progress in tx/participate in tx
