

NSF and SBI R Program

- NSF piloted Small Business Innovation Research (SBI R) Program in 1977
- Congress legislated the Small Business Innovation Research Act in 1982
 - Currently covers 11 federal agencies
- NSF SBI R program emphasizes Translational Research to achieve Technological Innovation




NSF SBI R Program and Academic Linkages

- Approximately 60% of NSF SBI R (and 100% of STTR) awardees have active collaboration with universities through:
 - Spin-offs from academic research
 - IP licensing from universities to small businesses
 - Subcontracts to the university
 - Faculty Consultant arrangements
 - University facility use or services




Innovation through Partnerships with Investors and Industries

- Phase I I B Third Party Investments
 - 2008: 21 companies / \$23M
 - 2009: 37 companies / \$44M
- SBI R Mergers and Acquisitions (M&A)
 - 2006: 17 SBI R firms
 - 2007: 19 SBI R firms
- Estimated average value of an acquisition:
between \$10 and \$20 Million

NSF expanding Academic Partnerships

- NSF-funded collaborative research centers spur innovation and provide a fertile synergy between universities and industry
 - Engineering Research Centers (ERC)
 - Industry/University Cooperative Research Centers (I /UCRC)
- ERC and I /UCRC require substantial industry involvement, SBI R firms benefit from the expertise of industry members and talent of the students and faculty at these centers
- NSF offers opportunities to Small Business awardees to join NSF-funded centers:
 - I /UCRC memberships
 - 2008: 23 companies
 - 2009: 25 companies
 - ERC memberships
 - 2009: 7 companies
