One Wei or Another

Earning a name for yourself in science can be a struggle. Imagine how much harder it would be if your name was routinely confused with several others. That often happens to researchers with Asian names, many of which may share the same English transliteration.

To address the issue, the American Physical Society (APS) will let authors with Chinese, Japanese, or Korean names include the Asian spellings (in parentheses after the English equivalent) on papers in the society's journals, including *Physical Review Letters*. An editorial announcing the policy in December noted that at least eight different Chinese names (shown at left) are transcribed as Wei Wang. “I think this is a great way to show that science is an international matter,” says Wei Wang (王为), a particle physicist at the University of Wisconsin, Madison. Adds Wei Wang (王巍), a biophysicist at the University of California, San Diego, “All the journals should do the same thing.”

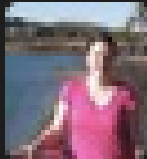

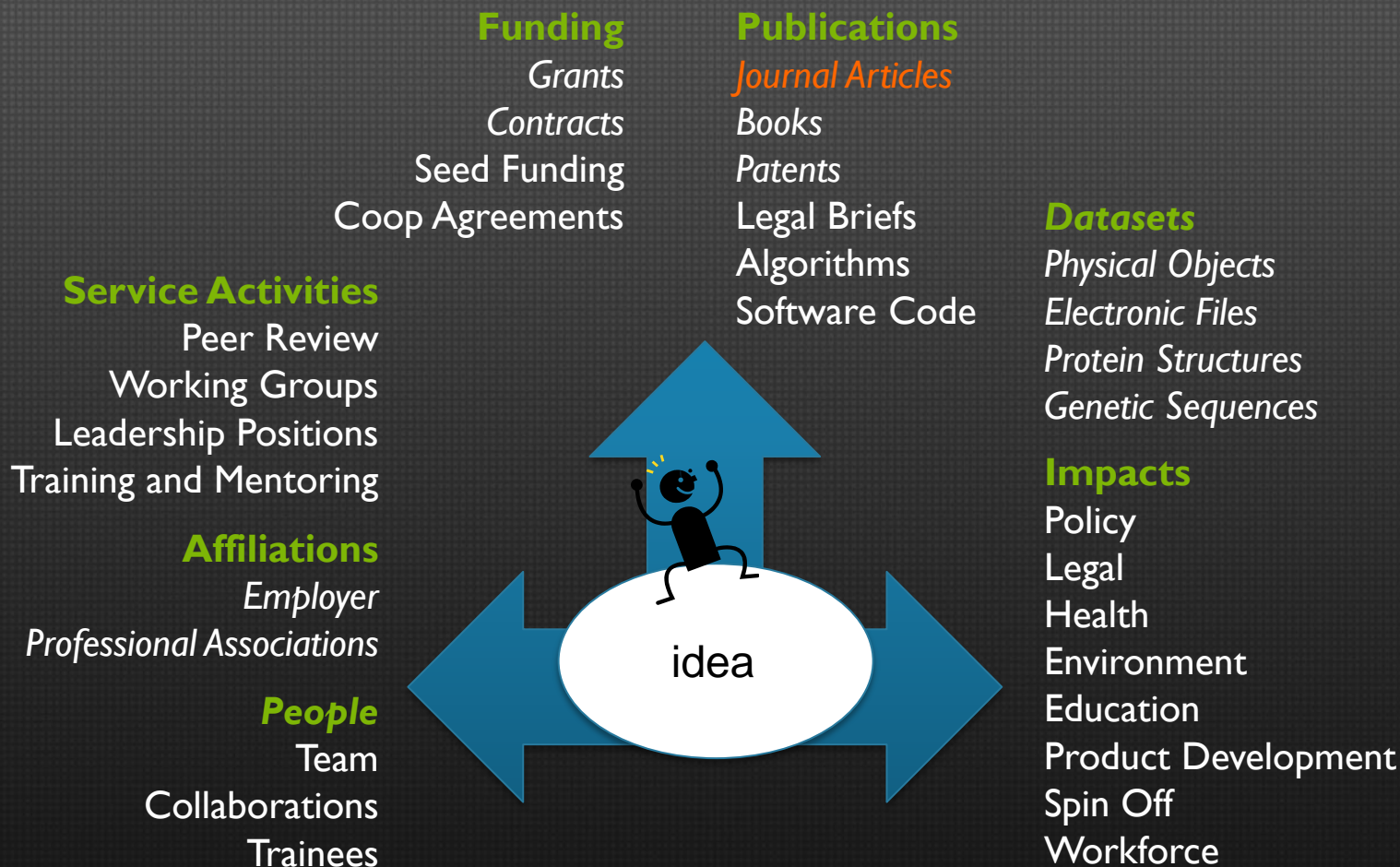

- Non-profit, non-proprietary, open, and community-driven
- Global, interdisciplinary

 - Funding organizations

The ORCID iD

- Unique, persistent identifier for researchers & scholars
- Free to researchers
- Can be used throughout one's career, across professional activities, disciplines, nations & languages
- Embedded into workflows & metadata
- API enables interoperability between siloed systems

Why Researcher Identifiers?

There are 23 faculty members with the name "J. Lee" ... at the University of Michigan alone.

A researcher's name isn't enough to reliably identify the author of, or contributor to, an article published in a journal or a dataset uploaded to a repository.

What Is ORCID?

ORCID ("orkid") stands for Open Researcher and Contributor ID.

The ORCID initiative focuses on solving the name ambiguity problem by creating persistent unique identifiers and linking mechanisms between different ID schemes and research objects.

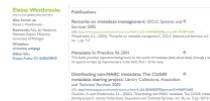
The Office of Scientific and Technical Information has modified the E-Link and Announcement Notices to include ORCIDs.

This post is about ORCID, which is pronounced "oar kid" and stands for Open Researcher and Contributor ID. Yes, this is another profile ID. It is somewhat like Researcher ID and Scopus ID but somewhat different. I'll talk about this unique identifier from my experience.

The main reason for such an ID resembles that for a DOI for journal papers. The Web address of a paper might change, but with its DOI you can trace the paper to its new location. Some people have multiple forms of their names or change their names after marriage. To keep track of a researcher and his or her works lifelong, it makes sense to have a unique identifier.

D. Encourage adoption of unique persistent researcher IDs

To measure the output of individual researchers, it is important to reduce the ambiguity associated with commonly occurring names. An international, non-profit organization called the Open Researcher and Contributor ID (ORCID) now provides a persistent digital identifier that can be associated with author names in publications. The ORCID system also will allow individuals to identify their research output and create a registry of IDs. SciENcv will include a utility that will make it easy for users to obtain an ORCID and to link it to their publications and grants. A broadly used researcher ID also will facilitate the identification of scientific output from those who work outside federally funded research programs. The acquisition of ORCIDs will be facilitated by SciENcv.

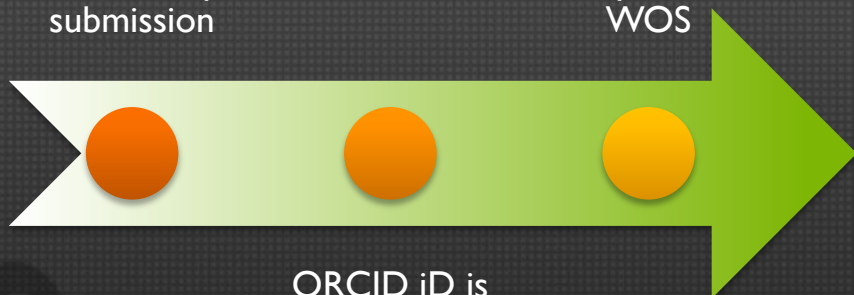

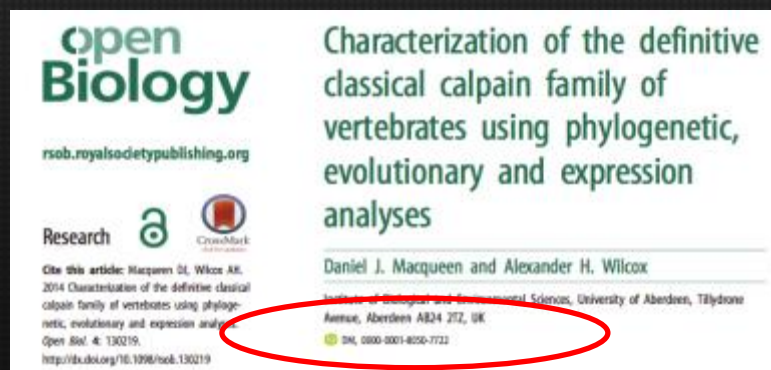
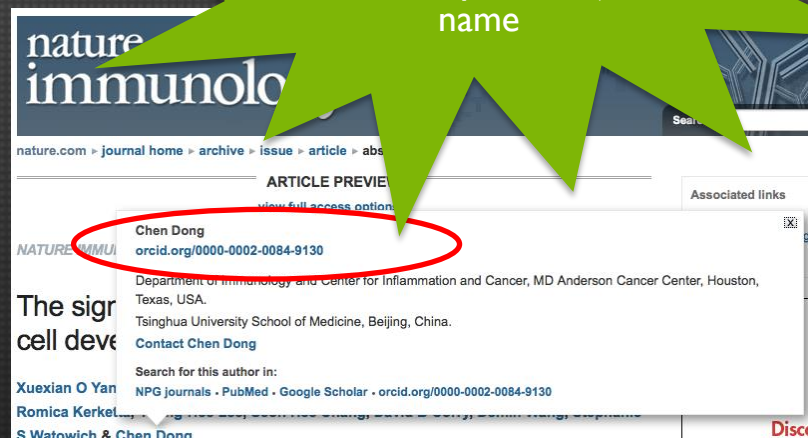

How can ORCID help with outcomes tracking & reporting?

A persistent identifier benefits researchers & organizations

- Distinguishes them from all other researchers
- The unique ORCID identifier stays with researchers throughout their careers
- Connects them reliably with their research outputs
- Improves discoverability of their research
- Widespread embedding of the ORCID identifier improves information sharing—offering us all better data in the future

ORCID Public Data

“All data contributed to ORCID by researchers or claimed by them will be available in standard formats for free download (subject to the researchers’ own privacy settings) that is uploaded once a year and released under a CC0 waiver.”

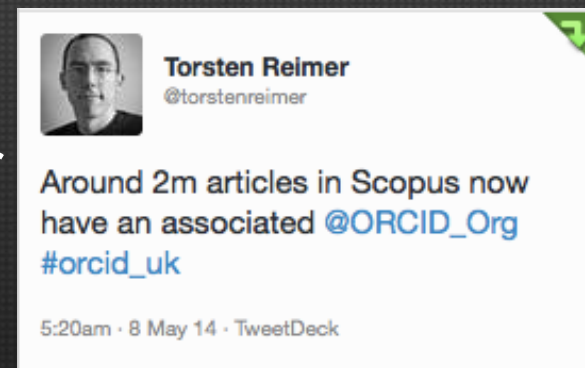
Their ORCID iD will:

- Remain with them throughout their career, even as they
 - Change names
 - Move between institutions, nations, and disciplines
- Reliably link them with their research outputs
 - Publications
 - Datasets
 - Funding
 - Other outputs
- Encourage them to USE their iDs in
 - Manuscript submission & grant proposals
 - CVs, web pages, email signatures, & more
- Help ensure that they get credit for all of their work and improve discoverability of their research

Organizational membership

Member organizations may use the member API to:

- Read information from an ORCID record
- Send data such as publications to ORCID records
- Integrate a search and link wizard to enable researchers to connect with their works
- Link ORCID identifiers to other IDs and registry systems
- Create ORCID records on behalf of employees or affiliates
- Validate information in ORCID records
