

## Title IX Policy Summit: Pregnancy Accommodations for Students & Postdoctoral Fellows - A Mandate Embedded in Title IX

*A post-doc told her PI that she was pregnant and needed maternity leave. He told her that she needed to return two weeks after the birth if she wanted her job back.*

Title IX's implications for collegiate sports are widely acknowledged, but prohibition of pregnancy discrimination and the resulting necessity to provide maternity leave for students have been largely ignored by research universities. As universities move towards full compliance with Title IX and work to resolve gaps in their policies, they will need the support and guidance of federal agencies that fund research universities and their work. The Committee on Women in Science, Engineering, and Medicine (CWSEM) of the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine is hosting a summit where representatives from federal agencies and other stakeholder communities will discuss recent developments regarding Title IX's mandates about pregnancy accommodation for students.

In 2012 the Obama Administration announced measures aimed at boosting the number of women in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). Research indicates that experiencing childbirth as a graduate student or post-doc is a major reason young female PhDs drop out of an academic research career before obtaining their first job. According to the National Science Foundation's Survey of Doctorate Recipients, married women with children are 35% less likely to enter a tenure-track job than are married men with children. Acknowledging and accommodating the needs that pregnancy and childbirth impose on young women researchers are key steps towards achieving the goal of increasing the numbers of women in STEM as well as retaining them so they become productive members of the research community.

This summit will bring together representatives from the major federal granting agencies, policymakers, higher education leaders, Title IX and pregnancy accommodation experts, and members of other relevant stakeholder communities.

This summit is hosted by the Committee on Women in Science, Engineering and Medicine (CWSEM) and organized by researchers Mary Ann Mason, University of California, Berkeley, and Joan C. Williams, University of California, Hastings, co-PIs of a National Science Foundation grant, "Title IX and Pregnancy Discrimination: Keeping Scientists in STEM after Childbirth. (IAA-1449752)" The goal of the grant is to aid implementation of Title IX's mandate to provide reasonable accommodations for students by organizing this summit and developing an on-line toolkit and other resources.
