Speaker Biographies

Steve Baskin, M.B.A., has been a camp professional since 1993. He is a partner in three US camps: Everwood Day Camp (Massachusetts), Camp Pinnacle (North Carolina) and Camp Champions (Texas) where he is the director. He founded the Outdoor School, a program that partners with schools to provide “camp education”. He is also working to bring camps to China and Chinese campers to US camps. Prior to becoming a camp professional, he worked for Goldman Sachs and the Boston Consulting Group.

Mr. Baskin is actively involved with the American Camp Association (ACA), serving on the National Board for 6 years. He currently serves as the US Ambassador to the International Camping Fellowship. He blogs for Psychology Today on Youth Development and Parenting. He speaks regularly about the power of the “camp education”, including a TEDx talk explaining how camp fosters “21st Century Skills” (as defined by the Partnership for 21st Century Learning).

He is participating in research to prove the outcomes of the camp experience (e.g., improved mindsets, increased resilience, and strengthened 21st Century Skills). These efforts include 1) the ACA Youth Impact Study, 2) a college persistence experiment involving KIPP students and 3) school-camp research with 70 groups of Title I students. Mr. Baskin was an honor graduate from both Davidson College and Harvard Business School.

Kim Fremont Fortunato, J.D., was named Director-Community Affairs and President-Campbell Soup Foundation in May 2016. Ms. Fortunato is responsible for Campbell's community affairs strategy and program, including employee volunteerism, Campbell's Healthy Communities programming, and enterprise-wide expansion of our community affairs strategies. Ms. Fortunato earned her Bachelor of Arts in French and comparative literature from Duke University, and her Juris Doctor from Widener University School of Law.

Maeghan Gilmore, MPH is the program director for health, human services and justice issues in the County Solutions and Innovation (CSI) department. In this capacity, she develops and directs the association's programs that provide information, training and assistance to county officials to help meet the emerging challenges they face in their communities. These programs cover a wide range of topics including health reform, rural health, mental health, housing, pre-trial services programs, juvenile detention reform, jail diversion and reentry issues.

Before joining NACo, Ms. Gilmore worked for a NACo affiliate, the National Association of County Behavioral Health and Developmental Disability Directors (NACBHDD), as director of government affairs and public policy. She also taught high school health education for five years in Michigan. She has a B.S. in Health Education from Western Michigan University, a certificate

of International Health from Boston University and an MPH in Health Policy, from The George Washington University.

Nathalie Hawkins, M.S., is the training and communications manager for Worldwide Safety & Health. In this role, she leads a team focused on global safety communications across Disney Parks and training development for the Facilities Operations Services organization. She supports both internal and external communication with the strategic goal of engaging and educating employees, guests, and the community in safety and wellness.

Over her 34-year career at Disney, she has had the opportunity of working at three Disney Parks in a variety of operational, project management and leadership roles and was heavily involved in the opening of Disneyland Paris. Originally from Quebec, Canada, Nathalie has a multicultural background and is fluent in French. She received her Master's in Science from California State University, Fullerton.

Woodie Hughes Jr., M.S., serves as the Fort Valley State University State Cooperative Extension Assistant Extension Administrator/State 4-H Program Leader. He serves as the 1890 4-H Program Leader representative on the National 4-H Extension Committee on Organization and Policy (ECOP-4-H) and is the first African-American to be appointed to the ECOP 4-H Committee, NIFA/USDA Vulnerable Populations Incarcerated Youth Chair, NIFA/USDA Professional Development 1890 4-H representative, and e-Extension Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee member. He is an altruistic, professional human services educator who is committed to helping people to help themselves, and has over 15 years of professional working experience as a 4-H positive youth development educator, over 7 years of professional working experience as a case manager, family consultant, substance abuse and mental health professional, mentor, and 15 years of professional experience as a 4-H camp director/counselor. He is a LEAD 21 Leadership graduate and has over 9 years of professional working experience as a NIFA/USDA grant proposals reviewer, Epsilon Sigma Phi extension member, and criminal justice adjunct instructor.

Mr. Hughes is originally from Chicago, and now resides in central Georgia with his wife, 16 year-old daughter, and 10 year-old son. He served eight years with the Illinois Army National Guard and earned an Honorable Discharge from the United States Military. He received his Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Criminal Justice from Chicago State University and is in the process of completing his doctorate degree at Walden University.

Jocelyn B. Richgels, MPP., joined the Rural Policy Research Institute (RUPRI) in September 2004. RUPRI conducts policy-relevant research and facilitates public dialogue to assist policymakers in understanding rural impacts of public policies and programs. As Director of National Policy Programs, Ms. Richgels ensures that our nation's policymakers access and utilize the research and practice conducted in RUPRI initiatives as they consider legislation that impacts rural America.

Ms. Richgels was born and raised on a family farm in rural southwest Wisconsin and her understanding of rural America stems first-hand from this experience. She has over 20 years of public policy experience, beginning her career as staff to a Member of Congress from Minnesota, who represented one of the most rural Congressional districts in the country at the time.

Juli Shaw, is a Project Manager at Disney Worldwide Safety & Health and currently leads the Walt Disney Parks, Experiences, and Consumer Products engagement efforts around the theme park guest and community initiative, Disney Wild About Safety. She has expanded this initiative to the Hong Kong Disneyland, Disneyland Paris, and Shanghai Disney Resorts. She is responsible for overseeing the execution of all activations in the theme parks as well as in the community while seeking opportunities to expand the reach of the program.

Her experience with The Walt Disney Company spans over three decades, dating back to her start in Resort Sales and Services in 1979. She has worked in a variety of client service roles within the Convention Sales and Services, Convention Entertainment, Business Development, and Disney Institute departments. She has been involved in the planning and execution of many of the Walt Disney World® Resort milestone celebrations and special events such as the Millennium Celebration at the Epcot® Theme Park. During the Celebration she was responsible for all hospitality and VIP services for visiting dignitaries from around the world. In her role prior to joining the Disney Worldwide Safety & Health team, she was an Alliance Manager with the Disney Corporate Alliances Department. She supported the execution of all account management initiatives in order to develop mutually beneficial relationships with each corporate sponsor company.

Lauren Tingey, Ph.D., MPH, MSW, is an Associate Director of the Johns Hopkins Center for American Indian Health, which she joined in 2008, and Associate Scientist in the Department of International Health at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health. Her research and service portfolio focuses on developing public health interventions with tribal communities to address behavioral and mental health disparities among Native youth and families. Projects to date have spanned suicide, depression, and substance abuse prevention; the promotion of youth entrepreneurship to address the twin problems of poverty and poor health trajectories; and sexual and reproductive health promotion. Dr. Tingey conducts community-engaged research, with a focus on strength-based approaches to positive youth development. Dr. Tingey's recent works centers on the development and evaluation of interventions to address sexual and reproductive health disparities among American Indian adolescents and young adults, specifically on risk reduction for sexually transmitted infections (STI), HIV/AIDS and unintended pregnancy. She has expertise in a range of methodologies, such as randomized controlled trials, case-control studies, qualitative research, cultural adaptation, mixed-method designs, and community-based participatory research. Dr. Tingey is the Principal Investigator of rigorous evaluation of a teen pregnancy prevention program, part of a national evaluation of innovative programs funded by the Office of Adolescent Health; Principal Investigator of a randomized controlled trial of a sexual health risk reduction counseling program for substance using adults; and Principal Investigator of a randomized controlled of a self-care intervention to motivate STI screening and other protective sexual health practices. Dr. Tingey also has an applied background, having worked as an HIV case management social worker in both domestic and international settings. Dr. Tingey's education includes a BS from Cornell University (2001), a MPH from Johns Hopkins University (2008); a MSW from the University of Maryland, and a PhD from the University of Amsterdam (2016).
