Title 13, U.S. Code

The Census Bureau is bound by Title 13 of the United States Code. These laws not only provide authority for the work we do, but also provide strong protection for the information we collect from individuals and businesses.

Title 13 provides the following protections to individuals and businesses:

 Private information is never published. It is against the law to disclose or publish any private information that identifies an individual or business such, including names, addresses (including GPS coordinates), Social Security Numbers, and telephone numbers.

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The Research Problem



"Too many statistics published too accurately from a confidential database exposes the entire database with near certainty."



Disclosure: The release of information that would enable the identification of an individual, or otherwise reveal sensitive information that could be linked to an individual.



Privacy-loss Budget: The Data User Perspective



- 1. Decisions on the amount of noise to inject into the data are inherently subjective
- 2. Providing useful data should be *the* priority
- 3. The only real guidepost is a strong sense of how the data are being used at multiple geographic levels
- 4. A representative set of data applications needs to be assembled in order to determine what works and what does not. (The Federal Register Notice does not make the grade)



A Recommended Course of Action



- 1. Provide a representative group of data users with access to SF1 data from the 2010 Census at different noise levels
- 2. Engage users in an iterative feedback process that would demonstrate the utility (or lack thereof) of tables at different noise levels
- 3. Gather case studies of data applications that represent cross section of users and conduct a forum/workshop where analyses can be presented and discussed
- 4. Disclosure issues should not prohibit the release of files to the group, since the Epsilon can be set for some minimum amount of noise to ensure confidentiality










